Dear Ms. Dortch:

Pursuant to Section 1.1206(b)(2) of the Commission's Rules, on behalf of the Fixed Wireless Communications Coalition ("FWCC"), I am electronically filing this notice of an oral ex parte communication in regards to the aforementioned matter.

On October 30, 2008, representing the interests of FWCC, Christopher Hardy, Vice President of Comsearch, and Angela Parsons, Regulatory Staff Counsel of FiberTower Corporation, met with OET Chief Julius Knapp, Deputy Chief Ira Keltz, Associate Chief Bruce Romano, Deputy Chief Alan Stillwell, Technical Analysis Chief Robert Weller, and Policy and Rules Division Chief Geraldine Matisse to reiterate FWCC's strong opposition to the Wireless Strategies, Inc. ("WSI") request for a declaratory ruling.

At the meeting the parties emphasized the many objections to the WSI request, as outlined by numerous filings by FWCC and NSMA members, as well as other commenters. Specifically, the parties discussed its concerns with WSI's proposal to circumvent the Part 101 licensing and coordination rules, in conjunction with WSI's misinterpretation of the antenna standards in Section 101.115.² WSI's proposed

concurrent coordination is ill defined and lacks specific technical detail to properly evaluate coexistence with other licensees. Point-to-point microwave users are concerned about interference from unknown transmitter locations (DREs) as described in WSI's filings. The parties also noted that, contrary to WSI's assertions, the spectrum surrounding a link in the fixed point-to-point bands is not "wasted", but is either in use or may be used in the future by other licensees; to allow WSI to seize all surrounding spectrum without prior notification, licensing, or frequency coordination effectively transforms the point-to-point band into a wide-area license that benefits only one party, to the detriment of both a competitive market and the public interest.

FWCC plans to submit a supplemental *ex parte* filing detailing concerns with WSI's technical claims.
